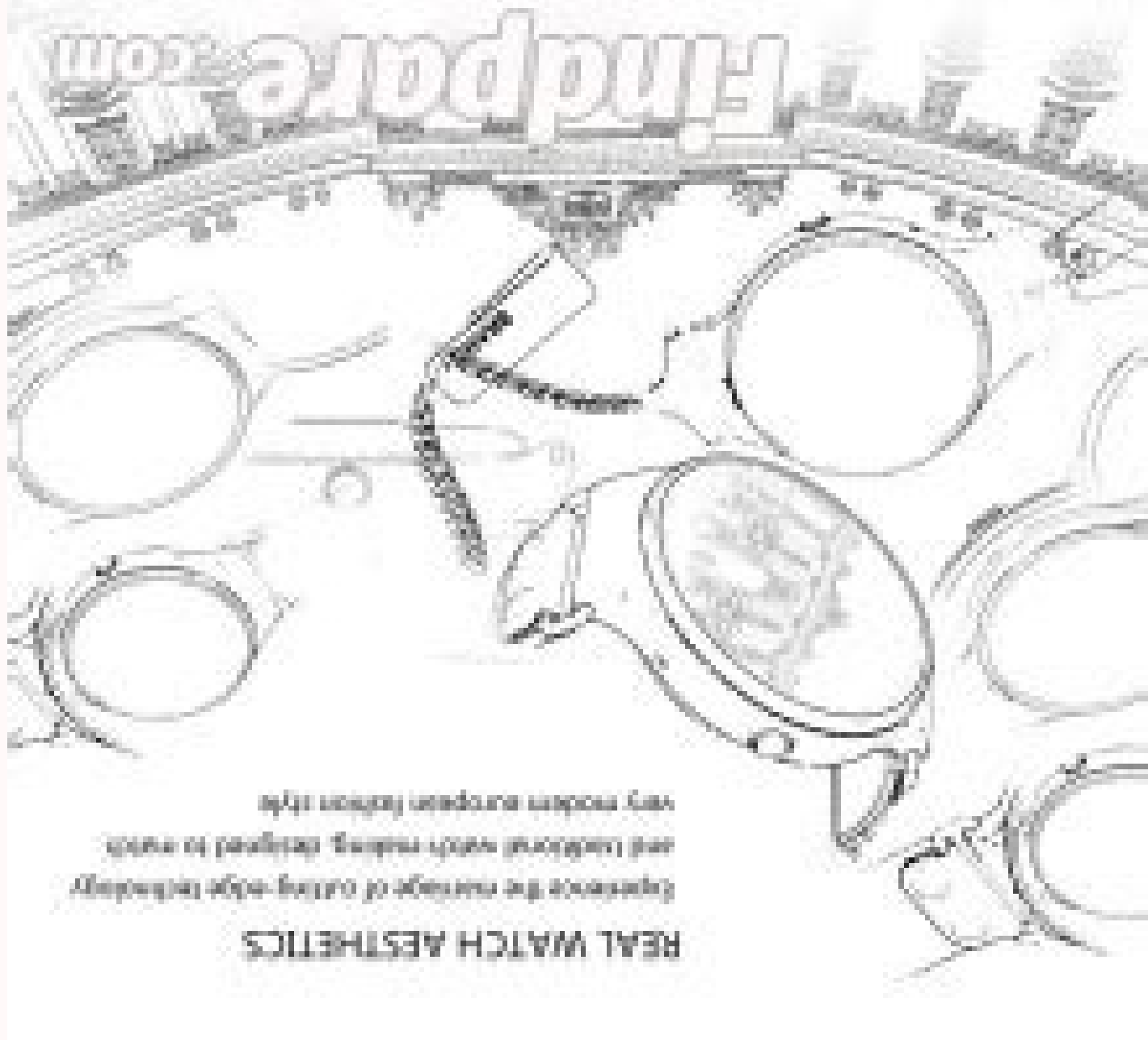

In recent years, the country has become a popular tourist destination and appears on more and more routes. Compared to neighboring India, Sri Lanka is much easier to visit. Distances are shorter and overall it's cleaner, cheaper and less crowded. Sri Lanka has a tropical monsoon climate with a peak season from December to March - in terms of weather, this is the best time to visit Colombo, Galle, Hill District and other cities in the southwest of the country. The weather in the north and east of Sri Lanka is best during the off-season, which lasts from May to August. April and September are considered off-season months and offer the best chance of good weather if you want to visit the whole country. Wild safaris, nature, tea plantations, historic cities, ancient ruins, diving and surfing can all be part of a trip to Sri Lanka. Here's how to make the most of your time there. 01 of 11 If you want to follow in the footsteps of the Buddha, join hundreds of other pilgrims on their journey to Sri Pada, also known as Adam's Peak. From a height of 7,359 feet, there is a beautiful view of the central highlands, which is especially breathtaking if you plan to climb at night and reach the summit at dawn. Interestingly, there is a common theory among religious people visiting this part of Sri Lanka. Buddhists say that the famous footprint found on the mountain was left by the Buddha, while Hindus say it is the footprint of Lord Shiva, and Christians and Muslims believe it was left by Adam when he and Eve died when they left the Garden of Eden. Bird watchers can also spot more than 90 species of birds, including waterfowl, cormorants, great waterfowl, pelicans and flamingos, that call the park's wetlands home. Kumana National Park, located in the southeast corner of the island, is more difficult to access but generally less crowded. If you can swing it, it's a great place to see leopards, elephants and birds in the wild. Close to the south coast, Bundala National Park is another popular spot for bird watchers. A little north and back towards the center of the island is the UNESCO World Heritage Site Sinharai Forest Reserve, which offers great jungle walks and bird watching and is well worth a visit. Udawalawe National Park is the most popular place to visit, while Minneriya National Park hosts one of the biggest wildlife sightings in Asia, known as "The Gathering", where more than 200 elephants gather in one place every August and September. But here's a secret: the nearby Caudulla National Park is just as good a place to see, and it's cheaper. It is also possible to see and spend time with elephants at the Pinnawala Elephant Orphanage, which can be visited on a day trip from Colombo. two of which are major cities. Located on the southwestern tip of the country, Galle is surprisingly modern. The coastal city was founded by Portuguese colonizers in the 16th century, but was further developed by the Dutch in the 17th century. Its main attraction is Galle Fort; a walk around it at sunset is mesmerizing. Located in the center of Sri Lanka, Kandy is the second largest city in the country. Known for its culture, it served as the royal capital of the Sinhalese kings from 1592 until the British takeover in 1815. The Temple of the Sacred Tooth was built in the royal palace complex and houses a tooth believed to have belonged to the Buddha. . Sigiriya, a popular UNESCO World Heritage site, requires a bit of climbing to get to the top, but you get great panoramic views. You can also go to the Pidurangala viewpoint to see the Sigiriya rock fortress for a small fee. In the land of Sri Lanka's high mountains, Horton Plains National Park offers some of the country's most enjoyable walks. For thrilling hikes in the heart of rolling hills, head to the densely forested Knuckles Range. From partying to total privacy, there's a beach for every taste. Unawatuna Beach, located near Galle on the south coast, is one of the busiest; Unawatuna Dive Center is a great place to learn to dive, and water sports are also great fun. Mirissa Beach, another large beach south of Unawatuna, is quieter and popular with whale watching and snorkeling enthusiasts. Those who really want to get away from it all can find deserted beaches to the south and east. Consider Navaladi, Kalkuda and the beaches along the Uppuveli to Nilaveli range. Surfing is also growing in Arugam Bay, along the eastern coast opposite Colombo. About 75 percent of the population is Buddhist, and the Buddha statues here are stunning. At the UNESCO World Heritage-listed ancient site of Polonnaruwa, you'll find a spectacular collection of Buddha statues carved from solid granite. One of them is an amazing 12th century 14 meter high monolithic reclining Buddha statue. Polonnaruwa was Sri Lanka's second capital after the destruction of Anuradhapura in 993. The UNESCO World Heritage-listed ruins of Anuradhapura are also impressive, while the rock temple at Isurumuniya is wonderfully free of tourists and you can admire a large, colorful reclining Buddha within its temple complex to be able to see. More amazing Buddhas can be found at the Rangiri Dambulla cave temple complex, about two hours north of Kandy. Each of the five rock caves contains carvings and paintings related to the Buddha and his life, with a large golden Buddha as the main attraction. Also worth seeing is Ritigala, an ancient forest monastery from the 1st century BC. If you are a tea lover this is a must. Tea replaced coffee production in Sri Lanka in the mid-19th century after disease devastated the coffee plantations there. This makes Sri Lanka the fourth largest tea producer in the world today. Most tea plantations are located in the Hill Country and adjacent southern areas, and many offer free tours of the tea factories. Nuwara Eliya Tea Estate is located in the heart of the Upper Hill Country and the Pedro Tea Factory is one of the finest tea plantations in the area. The factory was built in 1885 and offers full tours. blue fieldThe gardens are also worth a visit. About 30 minutes from Galle in Ahangama, the Handunugoda Tea Estate produces more than 25 varieties of tea for the Herman brand, with the main specialty being raw white tea. One of the most popular routes is through the Hill Country to the town of Ella. The drive from Ella to Badulla (one hour one way) is perhaps even more scenic, with a large Buddhist temple within walking distance of the train station. Many visitors spend a relaxing few days in Ella as it is home to some of the best guest houses in Sri Lanka.
